Nancy Fraser Helps Brazil Make the Case for Marriage Equality

The New School's thought leaders are playing an influential role in the global discussion on Marriage Equality.

On May 5th the Brazilian Supreme Court ruled that the government must grant civil unions to same-sex couples, making Brazil the world's most-populous nation to do so. In the finding, the court cited the work of **Nancy Fraser**, Henry A. & Louise Loeb Professor of Philosophy and Politics at The New School for Social Research. Quoting Fraser's 2000 article "Redistribution, Recognition, and Participation: Toward an Integrated Conception of Justice," in which Fraser writes of "the politics of recognition [whose] goal, in its most plausible form, is a difference-friendly world, where assimilation to majority or dominant cultural norms is no longer the price of equal respect."

Reflecting on her role in Brazil's step towards marriage equality, Fraser says, "I am as proud of this as of anything I've ever done. It helps assuage my chronic doubts about doing philosophy while the world burns. Maybe what I do is not so useless, after all."

**Janey Program Fall Lecture: Revolutionary
Agonistes: Latin American Revolutions 200
Years Later**

Thursday, September 22nd, 6:00 – 8:00 p.m.

Jeremy Adelman, Walter Samuel Carpenter III Professor of Spanish Civilization and Culture and director of the Council for International Teaching and Research at Princeton University, will be delivering a lecture entitled “Revolutionary Agonistes: Latin American Revolutions 200 Years Later.” He is the author or editor of eight books, most recently *Sovereignty and Revolution in the Iberian Atlantic* (2006) and *Worlds Together, Worlds Apart: A History of Humankind from Origins to the Present* (2010). He has just completed a biography of the great 20th-century social scientist Albert O. Hirschman.

For 200 years, Latin Americans have wrestled with the meaning of their secession from the Spanish and Portuguese empires. They have treated their revolutions both as heroic triumphs and tragic defeats. What’s been consistent is the obsession with these upheavals as the formative moments for Latin American nations. Professor Adelman suggests an alternative hypothesis, that the process of uncoupling these societies from old empires gave birth to

modern representative politics, that within that invented practice, Latin Americans struggled to give shape to political communities, and that the “nation” was only one among possible outcomes. It was the proliferation of possibilities that gave these revolutions their durable effects.
